

The developing world's water carriers

- Due to cultural traditions, it is girls and women who do most of the water-gathering in the developing world
- This is harmful for them in several important ways







Physical harm

- Water is heavy! Carrying it is tiring!
- Carrying it can cause potentially lifelong neck and back problems





More Physical Harm


- When girls and women walk for water, they are often in isolated environments
- They are vulnerable to snake bites, assaults, robbery, rape, and even death





Social and Economic Harm


- Gathering water takes hours out of each day
- Those are hours . . .
 - When girls can't be in school
 - When women
 can't be caring for
 their children or
 earning income
 - That confine females to poverty



Water for toilets and hand-washing

- When there is no nearby water for toilets and hand-washing, menstruating girls miss school due to no place to care for themselves
- Missed classes means more missed educational opportunities, and more confinement to poverty

- New wells
- Rehabilitated wells
- Repaired or replaced hand pumps
- Rainwater catchment and storage systems
- Communal toilets and handwashing stations
